Membership

As announced at the AGM and repeated to the full May meeting, we will try a new approach to admission control to our meetings such that, as from September, only members and their guests will be allowed in until 7:50 pm, after which it will be first come, first served. In mid-June, the Garrick informed us of the hire charges for the next two years: for 2010 they go up almost 32% and for 2011 by a

further 20%. We assume this to be in response to the removal of local authority subsidies.

Meetings

April 21st, Neil Kermode's tremendous delivery of his lecture 'Ocean Power' was full of superb touches such as 'we've stopped making oil' and the comparison of the state of development of extraction of the energy of the seas with Wilbur Wright's early efforts to fly brought home the relatively imminent energy crisis to the 130 Members and 27 Visitors present. Another powerful performance, then, to end an excellent 2008-2009 season of lecture meetings.

Dissection and Display in the 18th Century provided an interesting counterpoint to recent more technical lectures for the 89 Members, 29 Visitors and 2 Students attending on 14th May. A rather gruesome interest in the hanging and subsequent public dissection of criminals led the 18thC public to accept the display of suitably preserved and presented body parts, objects which today are reserved for museums. To top it all, the presentation on May 14th by Simon Chaplin was possibly the best we have seen.

The AGM saw Richard Tetley retire as President and Professor John Campbell elected into that role. The Management Committee also reluctantly parted with Cliff Ricketts, who has been a tower of strength and fount of good advice for so many years that we've lost count. Marion Sadler also retired from the committee under the rules of the Constitution and the remainder were re-elected en bloc. We were pleased also to have Dr Robert Giles elected to the committee. Bob, now retired, lives in Sutton Coldfield and was a chemist for an electro- plating company.

AOB brought a lively discussion on the problems of our growing membership and limited venues.

Visits

Following last year's excellent talk at our supper by George Hook, Tim has arranged a visit to His Mother of Pearl factory. This should be a very interesting visit to see how it all actually done.

Tim has also organised a very special day out at the National Physical Laboratory at Teddington. An all-day outing to see inside several of the best equipped and staffed laboratories in the world plus a talk and lunch in the historic Bushy House. Where else could you get all that for the price which Tim has arranged for you!

The visit on 18th June to Apedale Heritage Centre and the Moseley Railway Trust was enjoyed by 23 members. We were given a tour of the more accessible parts of the drift mine itself, entering via a slightly daunting 1 in 4 slope. Miners would then have proceeded to a lower level on a 1 in 2 slope but the public is not allowed that far down. In addition to a large display of mining equipment and a mockup miner's cottage, the Museum records the presence of a large Roman settlement in the area. With facilities for 18", 24" and 30" gauge rolling stock, the associated Railway Trust has some 60 narrow gauge locomotives, mainly electric or ic-engined, the largest such collection in the country and we were able to drive some of these on the site.

The 9th July visit to Birmingham Post Print House and Editorial Offices was postponed at the last minute due to the redundancies resulting from the reorganisation of the company.
